At Baptist Health Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, we started 2020 on a highly positive note.

After months of construction and planning, on March 6 we held a ribbon cutting for our new bariatric care unit. Local dignitaries, our board members, friends from the community, and staff were present to commemorate the newly completed wing. Our bariatric care center features state-of-the-art equipment, nutrition management, and a professional medical team in a luxurious, comfortable setting. The compassionate staff, specialized furniture and lifts allow persons of size to recover in a compassionate environment.

Our outpatient rehabilitation services were also ready to open and provide a convenient option for those in our community needing therapy.

Although the COVID-19 pandemic has altered our current course, our goal remains the same; to serve medically complex patients in a friendly and comfortable setting. We look forward to offering these needed services as soon as possible.

By mid-March, nursing homes in NY State received guidance from the Dept. of Health restricting visitors into the building to protect the health of residents. Our Activities and Social Work departments jumped into creative mode to

keep families connected with their loved ones, putting technology to use. Skype and Face Time sessions are now a daily occurrence, as are window visits and birthday parades. Residents are being seen by activities staff one-on-one, and many are enjoying personalized music from our Music and Memory™ program. Although there is no substitute for seeing a loved one in person, these alternative activities are helping to keep our residents both safe and connected.

We thank our community for its continued outpouring of support in the form of PPE, cards, flowers, food, signs and so much more. They are so appreciated, and help to boost the morale of our dedicated staff members.

Staff continue to come in every day to take care of the residents, even though they are uncertain of all the risks of COVID to themselves and to their families. Due to the state mandated restrictions on nursing home visitations, I frequently tell staff that now, more than ever before, our residents are counting on us to be there for them.

Baptist has made every effort to connect residents with their families through email, telephone, virtual visits, and window visits. While we understand there is no substitute for in-person visits and hugs, we are providing every means available to connect families with their loved ones to the extent permitted by the NYSDOH. We are extremely grateful that we have had no confirmed cases of COVID among our residents. This is largely due to our adherence to strict infection control procedures, weekly testing, daily screening of employees, and other precautionary measures. We are reassured

of our infection control practices by our recent NYSDOH Infection Control Survey that resulted in zero deficiencies.

Baptist is incredibly grateful to the community and community organizations for their support during this historical time. The families and residents we serve have been incredibly understanding, supportive, and patient. Our vendors have been extremely generous. Baptist's volunteer Board of Directors have given so much of themselves to support our mission, our residents, and the employees at Baptist. We miss our nearly 200 dedicated volunteers who would like to come back to the facility and help us and our residents in so many ways. Whether it is letters of thanks and comfort to employees and residents, PPE, masks, gowns, sanitizer, popcorn, coffee, donuts or luncheons, I say thank you to all for being there for Baptist and our residents.

Finally, Baptist extends its deepest sympathy to those who have lost loved ones to COVID. We are hopeful that with all of the incredible advances being made with therapeutics and vaccines to treat COVID we will get back to some semblance of normal soon.
